Community members took steps to form a local environmental organization F.R.E.S.H Inc. Fernald Residents Environmental Safety Health

• Became a 501c3, non-profit organization with Articles of Incorporation filed with the State of Ohio and IRS.

Define what group structure you want your organization to have:

- As an organization you learned to channel the anger into positive action working towards a solution.
- Form a Board that is involved and works with members.
- Define purpose and remain focused. What are the issues and concerns that brought the group together?
- Hold public meetings and invite the opponent, local officials and agencies.
- Members must educate themselves on the issues so they may inform the community. the elected officials also understand and talk with the opponent.
- Recruit in-kind contributions such as consultants, lawyer, accountant
- Contact people who are educated on related issues.
- Provide speakers related to the issue
- Use the media-they can be your best friend
- Align yourselves with similar groups at other sites and national organizations. Share information and work together when possible.
- Do not allow a national group's agenda to overshadow your goals

How to build a relationship with the opponent or agencies?

- Economically best to invite the community to have a seat at the decision making table than hiring a lawyer.
- Respect each other.
- Get the company to empathize with your fears and concerns. Remind the
 opponent of their responsibility to human health and the environment and safety
 of workers.
- Legitimize your fears and issues with tools related with issues.
- Speak of the core values to the issue you want to resolve.
- Maintain working relationships with your opponent, local and elected officials
- When visiting your local and federal officials, have a clear message and a solution.
- Work with legislators to get laws passed

F.R.E.S.H. Achievements using these principles:

- 1. Convinced company to recognize and protect human health and the environment.
- 2. Company removed the sources of contamination, cleaned up and restored the site
- 3. Requested and received an Emergency Warning system.
- 4. Requested and received a public water system.
- 5. Legislation: Federal Facility Compliance Act
- 6. Protected Green Space.
- 7. The Fernald site is now a preserve with a Visitors Center / History/ Reading room
